The Club continues to go steadily on. We're well into our 60th year now, and we'll have a celebration later in the year. But let's see what we have coming up:

January 28th is when we will be celebrating Burns Night, our host, as usual will be **Gordon**Mallory, who knows a thing or two about Burns and Scottish song.
We will have the traditional repast of haggis, neeps and tatties – so make sure you put your order in.



Scottish songs and tunes are the order of the night – but feel free to perform something else – we are sure Burns wouldn't mind.

For **February 4**th we've sent an invitation to members of local community choirs to come along and see if our singaround evenings might appeal to them. Several local clubs are doing the same around this time, in partnership with Saltburn Folk Festival and the Access Folk project. So we'll make any visitors welcome, as I believe we usually do, and ask if our performers can perhaps do something lively to appeal to them. It's free admission for everyone that night too!



We have a **Hot Spot** on **February 11**th, an evening when a performer is offered the chance to put a set together.

George Featherston, (yours truly) has volunteered to have a

go, and I intend to sing some of the traditional rural folk songs our great-great grandparents knew, and say something about their origins.

February 18th will be "Singers and Musicians", that is, Club regulars and visitors who will get up and perform a couple of numbers, and perhaps more if time allows. When the club started we relied more on the guests for the songs, but it's a tribute to the folk scene that more and more people were inspired to learn material and have a go. We have a very diverse range of song from old British traditional to Americana via material brewed up by some of our talented members. All are welcome and audience are needed as much as performers.

We welcome Janice Burns and Jon Doran on February 25th.

This Anglo-Scottish duo very much has



roots in traditional song, and use guitar and mandolin to enhance their personal take on it. They've two CD's out now. I've listened to them online, was impressed by their lyrical performance and am very much looking forward to seeing them live.



We've an extra guest night on March 4th when we have old Redcar friend Martyn Wyndham-Read.

We've booked him as he may not be touring much now and we couldn't let this chance slip. Famed for promoting the Australian bush songs he learned over there in the late '50's and writing many great songs of his own, he's always been a promoter of the songs of late local icon Graeme Miles. If you've seen him you don't need to be told more and if you haven't, DON'T miss this chance.

Our own Ian Tyzack has a Hot Spot on March 11th. Ian is a fine interpreter of modern folk, covering a wide range of songs that mean something. He's also written his own, and they're very



good. He has his own take on his material and is a genial performer with a clear delivery backed by fine guitar work. You'll enjoy this!

It'll be **Singers and Musicians** on **March 18**th and any other dates I don't specifically mention, and then we have

Tom McConville and Andy Watt on March 25th. Tom has been on the scene for many years and may be unique as having done many a solo gig with only his



fiddle to accompany his singing! He's been in plenty of well-respected groups as well and this time he's with guitarist Andy Watt. You'll get great songs in Tom's own style, some amazing fiddle playing and a large dose of humour. Serious entertainment!



Reg Meuross is a singer-songwriter who was born in Stockton but now based in Somerset, and he will be our guest on April 8th. He's an influential figure who has been around long

enough to have 15 albums to his credit. His songs are powerful and make you think. "And Jesus Wept", about one of those Shot at Dawn in WW1, is heart rending, while "Lizzie Loved a Highwayman", looking at Dick Turpin from his lover's point of view is poignant. I've seen him recently at Stockton, and I reckon this will be a good night.

April 22nd brings a
Theme Night of "St.
George". We used to do
a lot of such evenings;
they encouraged us to dig
into our gander-bags (to
quote Rambling Sid
Rumpo) and find
something to match the



idea. It's not actually compulsory and there is a loose connection clause (!) but it can be fun. St. George was martyred for his faith c. 300 AD and is the patron of many countries and cities beside England. Sadly some unpleasant people have hijacked his flag in recent times, so perhaps we could think of something to show the positive side of our land and its people?



The trio "Other Roads" will guest on May 11th. They are Pete Abbott, singer and mandolin player, Gregor Borland, fiddler (eight times Scottish Champion!) and Dave Walmsley, singer-songwriter and multi instrumentalist. They're a high-profile band, but Pete says his focus is always on being an entertainer, while Dave has a serious sense of humour. I looked at their repertoire online as well, and I reckon we'll have a great time!

On May 27th our own Trevor Taylor has a Hot Spot. Trevor is a longtime member and performer at the Club with a wide repertoire and a special affection for the



old Music Hall and those singers our parents loved to hear on the radio. Trevor's a lively performer who always engages with his audience and I know this will be a very entertaining night.
